## Instructional Sequence (before, during, and after instruction)

### Step 1

Students share with their groups their ideas about the following question. "Is there is a right time for a soldier to disregard a direct order from the president, and if so, when would that be"

## Step 2

As a class, view the photos and background of the "Old Soldiers Never Die" speech from the PowerPoint. Analyze the excerpt from the primary source (also in handout format) to discover the purpose for MacArthur in delivering this speech.

#### Step 3

Share information with group or with class.

### Step 4

Student defends position in summary to pull together interpretation and understanding of primary documents and any modification of prior knowledge.



MacArthur's speech

# The speech ends as follows:

"Of the nations of the world, Korea alone, up to now, is the sole one which has risked its all against communism. The magnificence of the courage and fortitude of the Korean people defies description.

They have chosen to risk death rather than slavery.

Their last words to me were: "Don't scuttle the Pacific."

I have just left your fighting sons in Korea. They have done their best there, and I can report to you without reservation that they are splendid in every way.

It was my constant effort to preserve them and end this savage conflict honorably and with the least loss of time and a minimum sacrifice of life. Its growing bloodshed has caused me the deepest anguish and anxiety. Those gallant men will remain often in my thoughts and in my prayers always.
